In this presentation, I will take you through my journey of writing on a taste through

the social life of a food item that has little nutritional value but enjoys cultural and ritual

significance. In this workshop, let's think through how we write for an informed audience, how

to identify journals that are best suited for our research, and most importantly how to cope with

translating an idea into a journal article. Lastly, we will also discuss why do we need to be

conscious of what not to write. In my decade-long journey of exploring sweetness in West

Bengal and Bangladesh I have tried to complicate ideas of placemaking, health, and nutrition

and of late how we understand the relevance of documents in my journal publications. In this

1) Why are keywords important?

2) What is the central idea of my article?

3) Conceptual Framework

4) Retaining my voice in the literature review.
